degree from the University of Utah where he majored in Sociology and Anthropology and minored in Zoology and Chemistry. Earl's studies at the University were interrupted by two years of service in the U.S. Navy. Many years later, Earl earned a Ph.D. in Chemistry from Stanford University.

Earl entered the University in 1942

and was a freshman member of the Assembly Committee. He played for Utah's basketball team in 1942-1943 and was active in Sigma Chi. In fact, Earl's wife, Elies, was the "Sweetheart of Sigma Chi." The two were married in 1947 following Earl's graduation.

Earl's career began with Phillips Petroleum in Spokane, Wash. After three years, he moved to the San Francisco Bay area and eventually owned and operated four gas stations – "Skid's Royal Stations." In 1958, Skidmore sold the stations and began Pressure Vessel Service, a chemical company specializing in handling corrosive chemicals and creating chemical solutions. Earl devoted over 30 years to PVS and the chemical industry, serving as president of Esbro Chemical and president of the Northern California Chemical Association.

Earl has been a leader in professional and community associations

throughout his life. He was president of the board of directors for United Stations while working in the retail gas industry. He was on the board of directors of the San Carlos Chamber of Commerce and president of the San Carlos Optimist Club. Skidmore also served on the boards of three Silicon Valley electronics companies.

Earl and Elies have given two scholarships to CSBS students for several years. In 2007, they created an endowment that will award CSBS Honor Roll Scholarships to several students each year in perpetuity.

PARRY MEAD MURRAY, Distinguished Alumna

Parry Mead Murray graduated magna cum laude from the University of Utah in 1977 earning bachelor degrees in Anthropology and Psychology. Additionally, Parry took undergraduate and graduate courses in Folklore and Media Communications with an emphasis on Documentary Photography. In 2001, she also completed a master's in Museum Studies at San Francisco State University.

Parry is a third generation grape grower in Napa Valley, Calif. The family property, known as "Mead Ranch" is 1300 acres - 590 acres are in grapes, 30 acres for home sites and roads and the rest under a conservation easement with the Napa County Land Trust. Following a devastating fire in the summer of 1981, Parry arrived to help bring

in the harvest and stayed for another 21 years as the ranch and vineyard manager a position she turned over to her sister Jane in 2003. While managing the ranch, Parry became immersed in the wine industry and, through viticultural studies at the University of California Davis and field experience, took pride in producing fine Zinfandel and Cabernet Sauvignon varietals.

Parry also served in a number of organizations dedicated to resource conservation, sustainable agriculture, environmental protection and land use issues including the Napa Valley Grape Growers Association, the Napa River Watershed Force, both the Archer Taylor Preserve and the Planning Committees of the Napa County Land Trust and the Nanakila Institute in British Columbia.

ROTC NEWS: MEDAL OF HONOR RECIPIENT RECEIVES DIPLOMA

Don't let the education office fool you; there are some people out there who have become commissioned officers without having their bachelor's degrees.


On May 3, Retired Col. Bernard Francis Fisher, a Medal of Honor recipient, received his diploma in fine arts from The University of Utah during a commissioning ceremony of nine second lieutenants from ROTC Detachment 850, almost 57 years after he originally attended

"The University of Utah is extremely proud to call and claim (Colonel Fisher) as one of its own," said J. Steven Ott, dean of the College of Social and Behavioral Science and the diploma presenter.

When asked how it felt to finally receive his degree after so many years, Colonel Fisher said, "It's simply amazing. I didn't think I was ever going to get my diploma. I'm very proud to have it."

Also during the commissioning ceremony, the ROTC detachment officials presented the first Col. Bernard F. Fisher Leadership Award to its top graduating cadet as well as the Detachment 850 Distinguished Alumnus Award to Colonel Fisher.

Colonel Fisher was awarded the Medal of Honor for personal action above and beyond the call of duty by risking his life to save a fellow pilot who was shot down during action in the A Shau Valley of Vietnam in 1966.



During the battle, then Major Fisher landed his Douglas A-1E Skyraider on an airfield controlled by the enemy under intense ground fire, pulled the downed pilot from the wreckage and took him aboard his aircraft, successfully escaping despite several bullets striking the plane. The aircraft Colonel Fisher was flying that day is displayed at the National Museum of the U.S. Air Force at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio.

Born in San Bernardino, Calif., Colonel Fisher was raised and educated in Utah, calling Clearfield home, though he now lives in Kuna, Idaho. He was the first living Air Force recipient of the Medal of Honor and the first of 12 Air Force members to receive the medal from Vietnam. Colonel Fisher was awarded the Medal of Honor by President Lyndon B. Johnson Jan. 19, 1967.

"I would definitely not have done all of these things that I've done. I would have been forced to work full-time and that would have significantly limited my experience at the University."

Kacee now looks forward to graduate school. She'll apply for a Fulbright Scholarship this year and decide between law school and a master's in gender studies.

"I dream of working for the United Nations or an international non-governmental organization dedicated to women's rights or decreasing poverty," said Kacee.

CSBS WELCOMES CHINESE STUDENTS INTO PUBLIC **ADMINISTRATION PROGRAM**

government and nonprofit organizations across Utah.

The University of Utah's Master of Public Administration Program welcomed 24 midcareer professionals from throughout Hainan, an island province in southwestern China, this January.

The students, representing a variety of professional agencies, will spend 16 months on campus completing coursework and other necessary requirements for the MPA Degree. They will also spend time networking with administrators in public agencies,

Many western universities have forged relationships with Chinese universities and governments to provide training and to supply visiting professors and exchange students. However, from the best information obtained, this University of Utah student cohort is the first, perhaps in the world. The arrangement is being watched by leaders in China's national government and has received attention in the Chinese national press.

"The agreement represents an ambitious attempt by the Hainan Province government to develop leadership and management skills of its promising mid-career officials. An MPA education at The U will help them expand their managerial and policy skills, as well as provide them with important understandings about different approaches to administrative practices across national boundaries – and the edges of continents. The connection with Hainan Province also presents a wonderful opportunity for current and future MPA students, MPA alumni and other Utahns who work in public agencies and nonprofit organizations to exchange insights and understandings with these students from China about managing, organizing and leading across cultures and in different cultures," said MPA Program Director Rick Green.

The 23 students from Hainan were nominated for this program by the Hainan Province government through a highly competitive process. Many of the students already have graduate degrees in disciplines such as law, accounting, economics, construction management and public administration from universities in China.

The second cohort will arrive in Salt Lake City in May, 2009. Reportedly, the third cohort will follow soon after.

"Migration and Identity" the Topic of 2nd Annual Human Rights Conference

February – The Barbara and Norman Tanner Center for Nonviolent Human Rights Advocacy hosted a conference, "Migration, Rights and Identities: Examining the Range of Global and Local Needs." University of Utah professors, academics from around the country and a community panel considered research and practical issues involving migration.

The Altman's, with an assist from the College of Social and Behavioral Science and The U, have established an endowment for the Award and plan to fully fund it over the next several years.

Irwin Altman retired from the University of Utah in 2005 capping a 48-year career – 36 at The U. Altman's service included seven years as chair of the Psychology Department, four years as the dean of CSBS, and four years as vice president for Academic Affairs. He continues to serve on the CSBS Advisory Board.

CSBS Students to Lead ASUU

April – Patrick Reimherr, majoring in Political Science and Economics, was elected president of the Associated Students of the University of Utah for 2008-09. Jon Hayes, majoring in Psychology and Sociology, is serving as ASUU vice president.

Reimherr's and Hayes' campaign focused on three themes: communicating opportunities, collecting feedback and creating awareness. The administration will organize initiatives in each area hoping in turn to improve the student experience at The U.

CSBS Leads the Way at U Commencement

May - The College of Social and Behavioral Science awarded the largest number of bachelor degrees to U students at spring commencement. The 1,524 bachelor degrees (out of 5,174) represent 29% of The U's total undergraduate degrees. CSBS also awarded 184 graduate degrees. Three College departments were among those with the largest number of graduates: Economics, Family and Consumer Studies, and Psychology.

The U honored two CSBS professors at commencement. Sonia Salari, associate professor in Family and Consumer Studies received the University Distinguished Teaching Award. Alan Fogel, professor of Psychology, accepted the Distinguished Scholarly and Creative Research Award.

MPP Program Proudly Bids Farewell to First Graduating Class
